In the context of Mr Pelham's observations on apple pricing, in his **Inquiry Note ID13** (dated 22 February 2021), I attach an email exchange with DEFRA that confirms:

- The "Fruit: Value of Home Production Table 6 (£ Million)" data in RLH07 (Item (1) in my email of 22 February 2021) has been derived from raw wholesale market prices adjusted to allow for various factors in order to arrive at a "farm gate" price, as explained in the linked Metadata document.
- 2) The "Gala Apples wholesale price averages 2010/11 versus 2019/20" and "Gala Apples prices chart 2010 to 2020" in RLH07 (Item (2) in my email of 22 February 2021) are wholesale prices (prices received by/paid to the wholesaler) which have not been adjusted to provide an estimate of farm-gate prices.
